

A perfect time to invite a guest to join you in the pews!






100 GALLONS

A MEMORABLE EVENING — FOUR CHURCHES TOGETHER

Four congregations gathered for food, fellowship and learning about the important new UCC history book, *Afro-Christian Convention: The Fifth Stream of the United Church of Christ*, edited by Rev. Dr. Yvonne Delk. Dr. Delk and Rev. Dr. Henry Simmons, who is also a contributor to the book, Zoomed-in to the event attended by over 50 members from Clark-Grace UCC, Falcon Heights UCC, Macalester Plymouth United Church and St. Anthony Park UCC. The pastors from all four congregations conceived of the event. St. Anthony Park UCC were amazing hosts.

The evening started with a simple meal of bread and soup. Members of the four churches spread out and got to know each other. We then heard from Drs. Delk and Simmons, who spoke passionately about the hidden history of a group of churches present during the founding of the United Church of Christ called the Afro-Christian Convention. This group is now being referred to as the fifth stream of the UCC. Its history as a group begins in the late 1800s, but these vital faith communities trace their histories back much further; their roots go back to Africa.

We heard how the churches of the Afro-Christian Convention have been safe places where dignity, respect, resistance, and resilience is nurtured through a faith that is holistic, God-centered, deeply spiritual, communal, and family-oriented. They supported one another as they faced racism in society, and later within the United Church of Christ itself. They see worship as more than an intellectual exercise. It is a time to feel and experience God's Word with body, mind and soul; a time that the spirit of God restores and liberates them from all that holds them captive. And in response, they give God praise with their entire being, with joy, thanksgiving, and gratitude.

In reflecting on their history and present-day witness in the UCC, the speakers spoke of "Ubuntu," a Zulu word that refers to humanity's interconnectedness, sometimes translated as "I am because we are." The spirit of Ubuntu was felt throughout this inspiring event, from our shared meal, to the teaching and learning, to our joyful singing together at the end led by Rev. Oliver White.

AED = AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING

The church now has an AED device -- an Automated External Defibrillator. It is located inside the church building next to the front/main doors above the small table in the corner. We purchased it with some of the ERC (Employee Retention Credit) money.

Nick Stager will give a "Bystander CPR and AED Management" training here at the church on **Tuesday, April 2, 10:00 AM.** The training is 60 to 90 minutes long, with the goal of equipping attendees to know how to use the AED and perform CPR if needed. (NOTE: It will not be basic life support training, which is much more complicated and is the kind of training that medical personnel receive.)



This is the one and only training the church will offer. There is no limit to the number of people who can attend; all are welcome to get trained.

SERVICE PROJECT at "FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN" — **FRIDAY, APRIL 26** We get to pack food for international hunger relief again, this time in partnership with folks from UCC New Brighton.

There are 40 slots reserved for our two congregations. Friday, April 26, 7:00-8:30 PM, 401 93rd Ave NW, Coon Rapids. It's gratifying and fun. And it saves people's lives.


