

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



## AFRO-CHRISTIAN CONVENTION: 5th “STREAM” of the UNITED CHURCH of CHRIST

UCC parishioners and seminary students have been taught for decades that four “streams” or “strands” came together to form the United Church of Christ in 1957: Congregational & Christian, Evangelical & Reformed. That is correct, *but only partially so!*

From 1892 to the 1960s, the **Afro-Christian Convention** was composed of 150 churches and 25,000 members, located primarily in North Carolina and Virginia. The tradition of the Afro-Christian church, too long ignored and under-celebrated, now takes its rightful place in the canon of UCC history. It's the story of how an independent Black Church helped to form the UCC.



Two UCC clergy – editor Yvonne V. Delk (the first Black woman ordained in the UCC) and contributing writer Henry T. Simmons – will join us via Zoom. They'll tell stories, teach us some of our history, and invite us into conversation with one another.

## **AED = AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING**

The church now has an AED device -- an Automated External Defibrillator. It is located inside the church building next to the front/main doors above the small table in the corner. We purchased it with some of the ERC (Employee Retention Credit) money.



Nick Stager will give a "Bystander CPR and AED Management" training here at the church on **Tuesday, April 2, 10:00 AM**. The training is 60 to 90 minutes long, with the goal of equipping attendees to know how to use the AED and perform CPR if needed. (NOTE: It will not be basic life support training, which is much more complicated and is the kind of training that medical personnel receive.)

This is the one and only training the church will offer. There is no limit to the number of people who can attend; all are welcome to get trained.

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## **OGHS = ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING**

We have an opportunity to move beyond ourselves and give to others through the annual UCC special offering called "One Great Hour of Sharing offering" (OGHS). This year is the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of OGHS (!) and the theme is "It's Time To Share The Light." OGHS supports the disaster, refugee and development ministries of the UCC in the U.S. and abroad. Its reach to the human family in over 80 countries is extraordinary.

## **SCOUTS BSA: FORMING A GIRL TROOP AT SAPUCC**

The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) has been becoming increasingly inclusive for many years, beginning with Explorer posts in 1971 and Venture crews in 1976. Girls were added to the Cub Scout program and the Boy Scout program (now Scouts BSA) in 2018. Some time ago the Scout leaders of Troop 17 and members of the congregation made a proposal to the Church Council and received approval that the church may charter a Girl troop.

In Cub Scouts, Venturing and Explorers, the girls and boys are completely mixed in their units, separated only by their ranks of advancement. In Cub Scouts girls meet in their own dens, as part of a pack. The Scouts BSA program is set up differently. While the boys and girls may meet together, do many events and camping together, they are required to be organized as separate Girl troops and Boy troops, which requires separate adult leadership for each unit. Boy troops and Girl troops can have leaders both male and female, however a Girl troop requires at least one adult female over 21 years old to be a Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster, and to be present at all meetings and events where girls are participating.

We currently have two girls who are interested, both having been Cub Scouts in our neighborhood Pack 22, and we are actively recruiting their friends and schoolmates. We need several girls to join to make starting a Girl troop a success. We'd like to invite the girls in our congregation, local schools, and neighborhood to check out Scouting here at SAPUCC!

To join Scouts BSA, a person needs to be 10 years old and in 5th grade, or 11 years old. And if you know of others who might like to give Scouts BSA a try, please have them get in touch with us, or come to a meeting, which are on most Monday evenings from 7:00-8:30 PM here at the church. We have Scouts who live all over St. Paul and the Twin Cities area.

Adults, if you have interest in participating and volunteering in Scouting and would be interested in working with a Girl troop, we invite you to contact us. FYI, we have had and still have a number of Scouts who also participate in Y camps and various sports teams, and have been successful in all. You can do Scouting along with school and other activities.


