

As I was writing and assembling the various pieces to be included in this newsletter, I became aware of a theme: leave-taking.

- High school seniors are graduating soon and will be leaving home.
- The students in the OWL Cohort are wrapping up their time together.
- ♦ And even with the *Speaking Christian* book groups, there will be leave-taking of old understandings, interpretations and uses of explicitly religious language.

The process of discerning when to leave and the process of leave-taking are spiritual practices. Sometimes it is helpful to seek out trusted people in our lives during those times. Sometimes we discover our own inner wisdom that we weren't sure we had. Sometimes the Holy Spirit nudges us (or cajoles us?) and we figure out how (or if?) to pay attention to the Spirit's guidance.

One thing is certain: there will be the "before" and the "after" of whatever leave-taking we do. Before I retired, and after. Before I graduated, and after. And so on. These lines of demarcation are part of each of our spiritual journeys. We learn and grow even while we may struggle and stumble. As Marilyn Benson lifted up in worship a few weeks ago, we humans are often somewhere in the "Orientation-Disorientation-Reorientation" spiral. It's part of being alive!

This Spring, and as we move into Summer, may you trust your own inner wisdom, whenever your journey — including leave-taking — may lead.

Greetings, All!

I hope you are enjoying the longer days and are finding time to get outside. Despite the allure of the garden, it's important to remember that many of our six-legged friends are still sleeping and should be left



to their dreams. I encourage everyone to take a leaf out of Master Gardener Judi Petakau's book and be a "lazy gardener" this time of year. Let the leaves lay where they are and wait until late May or early June to do any major cleanup. Nature is messy and we need to practice letting it be as is. I encourage you to consider taking pictures on a daily or weekly basis to simply observe changes over time absent any intervention. You never know what you may see.

Throughout April, our Godly Play and Breakfast Club groups met regularly. In Breakfast Club we have pivoted from our Water Stewardship focus in the early part of the year to broader ecological topics. We joined the Adult Forum on April 14th to hear from Judi about techniques for improving habitat health in our own yards. We have also started seeds in several containers that are now placed in the churchyard. Take a peak at them if you get the chance.

To kick off May, we are coordinating a "Buy Nothing Exchange" with the Saint Anthony Park Faith Communities group. It will be at Hampton Park on Saturday, May 4th,10 AM to 2 PM. Donations will be accepted at any of the five churches before the event and at the park on the day of the exchange. Accepted items are toys and games of all kinds as well as any books or clothing for children. Buy-nothing exchanges are a fantastic way to reduce our consumption of new products by reusing items that others no longer need.

In mid-May, we will be wrapping up our program year. May 19th will be the final day of Breakfast Club and Godly Play until September. It is also the day of the Church Picnic, and I am inviting all high school seniors to join in to share a meal. I want this group of amazing young people to get to know each other better and figure out how we can better support them in their endeavors.

and engage with here. I didn't know the thoughtful, expansive approach that was taken with planning, preparing, and offering worship. I hadn't met the friendly, caring, committed people that are this church. I wasn't aware of the opportunities ahead to invite guest musicians into services. I didn't know the depth of support and appreciation for music here, nor did I know of the bold, inspiring preaching — preaching that deepens people's faith and vitalizes their lives. All of this became lively apparent over time. I am so grateful to have had the unexpected gift of nearly 5 years with you all.

It is not easy to relinquish being part of the SAPUCC staff. I have loved serving God and God's people in this place. However, I am feeling a strong need for greater flexibility in my professional and personal life. While I will continue playing as a freelance musician, I desire more freedom for family time, travel, and other opportunities. My husband Philip and I look forward to worshiping with you when possible, and we will hold dear the new friendships we have made among you.

May 19th will be **Melanie's final Sunday.** We will make time during the worship service that morning to honor Melanie and give her a gift of appreciation. It's Pentecost Sunday, so we will send her off with the blessing and energy of the Holy Spirit.

DONATIONS TO MCC'S "REFUGEE SERVICES" PROGRAM

Big-hearted gratitude for the way the SAPUCCers stepped up and donated items for the Minnesota Council of Church's "Refugee Services" program. The household and toiletries items – bed pillows, bar soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes, feminine hygiene products, disposable razors, laundry soap, dish soap and all-purpose cleaning supplies – will go directly to people who will benefit from them.

Refugee Services is an ecumenical ministry welcoming persecuted people from around the world into new lives of freedom, hope, and opportunity in Minnesota. Refugee Services has been a program of the Minnesota Council of Churches (MCC) since 1984. Since that time, Refugee Services has welcomed more than 10,000 refugees from around the world to lives of freedom, hope and opportunity in Minnesota. They offer "abundant support to newcomers through four lines of service: Case Management, Immigration, Employment and Education."

SAPUCC TO GIVE \$5,000 TO BEACON HOUSINGBy Craig Freeman

In December, Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative (my employer) opened Bimosedaa (bee-moh-SAY-dah), 48 homes of deeply affordable, supportive housing in downtown Minneapolis. Bimosedaa, an Ojibwe word meaning "Let Us Walk Together," is a partnership with the Red Lake Nation and the organization Avivo, who provides onsite services in the building. A minimum of 33, and generally all 48 residents of Bimosedaa will be Native Americans.



The services Avivo provides at Bimosedaa are done in a culturally relevant manner and are based on a "housing first" model. This means even if someone has untreated mental health or ongoing chemical dependency issues, we first house individuals and then invite them to participate in intensive harm reduction services to work on the issues they face. Accordingly, most of the initial residents of Bimosedaa moved directly from encampments into the building. Bimosedaa is located in an historic building at 4th Street and Hennepin. It was clear prior to construction there would be a lot of issues to deal with during the remodel. What wasn't anticipated, however, was that the building's façade was being held up purely by gravity. This, along with other issues, caused the cost of the project to balloon, and while Beacon's public funders have been very generous in closing the cost gap, there is still a gap remaining. Some of that gap will be closed by a matching grant from the Otto Bremer Trust, and this is where SAPUCC comes into the picture.

The Otto Bremer Trust has pledged \$100,000 if that amount is matched by other donors. Meanwhile, we at SAPUCC set aside \$10,000 of pandemic era ERC funds to donate for Native reparations. Over the last couple months, our Acknowledgement to Action Ministry Team has been discussing where to direct these funds and determined that \$5,000 should be donated to Beacon for Bimosedaa. This amount will then be matched by the Trust and double our impact to \$10,000! This plan was presented to Council at the April meeting and unanimously approved.


I was at Bimosedaa in late April speaking with residents and Avivo staff, and I could not be happier we are using some of our money in this manner. The building is truly a source of hope for its residents and will be so for decades to come.


"SPEAKING CHRISTIAN" BOOK GROUPS — STARTING MAY 6

Tuesday, April 16, 2024 6:30 PM

Meeting Called to Order (Mike Smith)

Approval of Agenda (approved)

Approval of February 2024 Meeting Minutes: Not received to date. Victoria will follow up with Jacob re: February Council minutes.

Relationship Building: Attendees broke into small groups to discuss crossroads in their lives, one of the big questions prompted by David Brooks' book <u>How to Know a Person.</u>

Reports:

Staff Reports (written reports, no discussion)
Treasurer's Report - (John) First quarter ended positively

Current Business:

Report on MITP Raffle Ticket Sales - (Mike). \$765 was raised. Our total fundraising goal for the year is \$3,500. Future anticipated fundraisers for 2024 include Troop 17's use of our tables and chairs for the Art Fair in June and the Holiday Bazaar in December.

New Business:

Payroll Protection Program (PPP) Money (Victoria). Victoria reviewed the history of our PPP loan, its forgiveness, uses of some of the money for Church Growth initiatives including the new website, and other uses for bigger one-time projects that have taken place and that we anticipate for the coming year. Victoria, Mike Smith and John Blair met re: the remainder of the PPP funds which currently are folded into "Free Unrestricted Net Assets." They recommend and Council agreed to keep the money in that category and to forgo any itemization of uses going forward. It is simply part of the "Free Unrestricted Net Assets" without any designation for use.

Girls Troop Start Update (Mike). Scouts BSA has been co-ed for the last five years. Troop 17 will be joined by Troop 7017 with 5-6 girls and its own adult leadership. Troop 7017 will have the option to be an independent unit or blended with boy Troop 17

ERC (Employee Retention Credit). Craig Freeman brought "two hats" to his proposal, as a member of the Acknowledgement to Action Ministry Team, and that of his employer, Beacon Housing. Of the \$10,000 ERC money designated for Native American reparations, the team has proposed that \$5,000 go to Beacon toward new housing for members primarily of Red Lake Nation who are homeless, called "Bimosedaa" in downtown Minneapolis. Motion: That the Council approve \$5,000 from the ERC funds given to Beacon for this capital project. Second: Deb Heuwinkel. Passed unanimously.

Churchyard Gardens (Mike, Cassie, Liam). A draft plan was presented to create a more eco-friendly environment on church grounds, with an Eagle Scout project as part of the plan. Phase I to be completed by May 19, 2024. Judi Petkau as a master gardener is involved, also Jacob Ristow and the Sunday School kids. Some funding from the church is needed to supplement a donation already received from a church member. The scout and troop will also look for in-kind donations. Motion from the Trustees: That the Council approve up to \$600 from Memorial Funds designated for facilities. Passed unanimously.

Repeat worship visitors (Victoria). Vic presented a list of repeat visitors, asking Council to connect with and welcome them.

Pic and Paragraph (Liam). Liam is looking for Council members to provide a picture and 3 sentences about events in the life of the church for Facebook and Instagram. Several agreed to specific months to do so.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:25 p.m.
